Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ! Many who know me know that prayer is very important to me. One of my prayer practices involves praying while I am driving. Yes, you can pray with your eyes open...


This is how it typically begins: I give thanks for the blessings of the day thus far (the sunshine, or gratitude for getting out of the house at a decent time, or Yay! Jeff put gas in my car!). As I drive along, I pray for the church, people going through difficult situations, loved ones. I pray for people I see walking, running, or working along the side of the road. I pray for those who need help and those offering help as I hear/see emergency vehicles. I pray for....Jackass! You cut me off! Or Jackass! Does your car not come with a turn signal?! Or Jackass! That sign says STOP not cruise on through the intersection!

Ahhh (exasperated breath). In all fairness, I will also call myself a Jackass when I do something stupid while driving – ask Lexi; she'll be happy to tell you. I also often pray for those who have kindled my road rage and interrupted my lovely conversation with God. Within seconds, I feel badly about my name-calling response and try to send good wishes into the universe as a way of making up for it. Of course, I realize it would be even better – OK, MUCH better – if I didn't direct any kind of negative statements to other drivers, but I am so very human...so, I keep trying. I keep praying in the car and praying in other ways, too. BIG Read to Dive into I Kings

Hello, CCC BIG Readers!! So what did you think of 2 Samuel? (Did you *finish* 2 Samuel?) No judgment if you haven't completed (most of) the stories of King David; at Central Christian we do NOT have a Bible jail. Start with 1 Kings and do the best you can.

At the end of 2 Samuel, King David's family has been torn apart because of strife among his sons, which also results in a civil war within the kingdom. Now that David's days are coming to an end, who will inherit the throne? Who will take David's place as King of Judah and Israel?

I Kings begins with David's death and the accession of Solomon. Solomon's renowned wisdom will be the focus of several stories – including one that scared me so badly as a child, I still remember the image of it in my Illustrated Children's Bible. The rest of the book will highlight stories of figures like Jeroboam, the prophet Elijah, and Ahab.

One of the biggest issues raised in this biblical book is the question of loyalty and faithfulness to God in the midst of the temptations of wealth, success, and prestige in the eyes of the world. Another, is reading how God works with what – and who – is available.

I Kings has 22 chapters. You can read 1 chapter a day in October and still have over a week to catch up if necessary.

Healthy Boundaries/Safe Kids Policy



In July 2016, Moderator Shelly Manning assembled a special committee to evaluate and revise Central Christian Church's Healthy Boundaries/Safe Kids Policy. When this policy was first created, our congregation was ahead of the curve; now, such a policy is required for insurance purposes. Copies of this policy are available upon request from the church office.

A few things that the Christian Education Team would like to highlight for our members and friends:

No children or youth are to be in the upstairs youth room without an adult who is 18 years or older and has a background check on file with the church.

No children or youth are to be in the Nursery without an adult who is 18 years or older and has a background check on file with the church; exceptions are youth who have gone through Safe Sitter Training. Those who have completed Safe Sitter Training must make Christian Education aware before working with our Nursery.

To convey their commitment to the safety and well-being of all our young people, all 2016-17 Board members and Christian Education team members are in the process of completing updated screening forms and background checks.

Our Young Church and God Squad Sunday school classes are also discussing bullying this fall in order to help our young people know how to spot and respond to bullying.

Thank you ahead of time for your support in keeping our young people as safe as possible when they are at church or church-sponsored activities.

Central has a Social Justice Task Force!

On Sunday, September 11, during the adult Sunday school class, Beth Duley and Bonnie Wilson, along with Shelly Manning and Brenda Waltermire, shared the idea of forming a Social Justice Task Force at Central Christian Church. At the September 18 Board meeting, the official creation of this Task Force was unanimously approved by church Board members.

The purpose of the Task Force: To provide opportunities for discussion about issues of justice and to form connections with diverse groups within our larger community.



The Task Force tag line: "Loving the World through Understanding."

A list of possible discussion topics is being compiled and include: Race Relations, white privilege/institutional racism, Immigration, Native Americans, Environment, Women/Equality, Poverty/Economic Justice, and the Death Penalty.

The class also brainstormed various forums in which to explore these topics; for example, meeting in individuals' homes or at the church, with Sunday School classes, utilizing apropos books or movies, inviting speakers to CCC, and attending workshops or marches.

Guidelines for participation/discussion were also lifted up during September 11's conversation. 1) All discussions/events are to be grounded in the understanding of Disciples of Christ freedom of belief and expression; 2) Use compassionate listening & paraphrasing when interacting with others, both those within our congregation as well as those from outside our faith community.

Given the current climate of our nation, it was decided that White Privilege & Race Relations should be our first topic. The Task Force's first event is Sunday, October 9, 2016 at 5 p.m. at Central. We will be watching the movie *Crash* with discussion to follow. This movie is rated *R*. Snacks and beverages will be provided by the CWF.

All events/activities of the Social Justice Task Force and information acquired on the topics we focus on will be shared with the congregation in various ways. Faith & Giving Ministry Report to the Congregation

Monday, September 19, 2016

Early in August, the Faith and Giving team examined the monetary giving of the congregation for the first 7 months of 2016. Monetary gifts from pledges were where we had thought it would be even a few percentage points ahead. We are giving what we promised to give. This is good news and worthy of celebration! There are, though, two concerns: 1) The timing of our giving is uneven throughout the year, and 2) what we currently pledge is not enough to cover our expenses.

Over the past four months, our Senior Minister, Rev. Rebecca Zelensky, has on 5 occasions since the spring had to delay depositing her paycheck because there was not enough money in the church checking account to cover the paycheck. This practice of delaying the deposit of a paycheck has occurred in the past, but this has happened more often in recent months.

The major cause for this is the uneven giving from week-to-week and even month-to-month. While the money eventually arrives by the end of the year – and for this, Faith and Giving is very grateful - in the summer in particular, funds from the church savings account must be transferred to checking to cover payroll and expenses.

In February, our church mortgage was refinanced for \$225,000.00. This was enough to pay off the old mortgage and enough left over to open a savings account with an initial deposit of \$25,494.49. Starting in April, we began withdrawing money to pay bills and meet payroll. To date, we have earned \$3.67 interest and withdrawn a total of \$19,330.00 leaving a balance of \$6,168.16.

Through August 31, 2016, Total Income was \$111,290.94. For the same period of time, the total just for Payroll and Property was \$122,153.37 To date, Payroll and Property are 90.73% of our expenses.

Excluding THE 175 FUND giving; to date on average, we are giving \$10,859.45 per month.

Excluding THE 175 FUND payments and the 175th Anniversary expenses, to date on average, our expenses are \$13,969.65 per month. To date on average, we are overspending \$3,110.20 per month.

To date, the monthly average for Payroll, Gas, Electricity, Water/Sewage, Insurance, and the Mortgage Payment is \$11,289.63 – that exceeds the average monthly giving of \$10,859.45 by \$430.18. This does not include expenses for other items necessary for our various ministries.

To address this situation, the Board has taken the following actions:

Any money donated in September to THE 175 FUND will be added to the September mortgage payment.

A portion of the funds raised through our Holy Cow Drop will be transferred to the savings account.

Two additional opportunities will help in the short-term:

Burial Plots: David Troyer has generously donated two Roselawn burial plots (Lot 42, "A" Section, Space 6) to Central Christian Church (DOC). They are being offered for sale within the church until November 30. If not sold by then, they will be sold to outside of our faith community. The plots are in a head-to-toe arrangement instead of side-by-side. Central Christian is selling them for \$1,950.00 each or \$3,800.00 for both. Central Christian will pay the transfer fee. Market value for a single Roselawn burial plot is \$2,000 or more. The proceeds from the sale of these burial plots will be deposited in the Savings account.

Stock Gift: Dorothy Drummond, the 2016 Holy Cow Drop winner, has donated a gift of stock with an approximate value of \$5,000.00. Once the transfer to an equity account is complete, the stock will be itemized, valued, and assessed for volatility and liquidity. The proceeds from the sale of any of the stock will be deposited in the Savings account. The Board consensus is that the stock should be liquidated quickly and prudently, then the equity account should be closed.

How can the congregation's members and friends help with the financial health of CCC?

Pledges: The single most important way we can help is by completing a pledge sheet for 2017 – regardless of the amount pledged. It is very difficult to plan for the next year unless we have an accurate idea of what our income will be. While pledge increases are needed and welcomed, our emphasis is on full participation with pledges. The pledges are for Sunday monetary offerings.

We are also asking you to pledge your time now that you will help with the Holy Cow Drop (Saturday, June 17, 2017) and any other fund raising events we may do the rest of 2017. Additionally, pledge to sell Holy Cow Drop tickets either by selling them personally or by working at the ticket booth (dates, times, locations to be announced).

The Board has voted to close THE 175 FUND. The total collected and paid on the mortgages was \$24,415.32. This is the equivalent of almost 14 extra payments. **This was truly an outrageous effort and deserves much celebration!!!**

To preserve us through the lean times, we would like to have a \$50,000 savings account – A Gifts for the FUTURE ACCOUNT.

We continue to encourage members of the congregation to review their estate plans and consider ways in which Central Christian Church (DOC) can be included in those plans. To assist members in making those plans, the Faith & Giving Team has arranged a helpful event. On Sunday, November 6, 2016, Enrique Ocasio, Vice-President, Great Lakes Zone, Christian Church Foundation will bring the message. During Sunday School, Enrique will lead a seminar/workshop about Estate Planning and Church Bequeaths.

We are happy to report that the final profit from our 25th annual fish fry was \$2,019.97 after our 10% contribution to United Campus Ministries that we donate from our proceeds each year. This was down just slightly from last year's profit of \$2,095.24.

We had a steady flow of people and at times nearly all of the tables were full with a lot of people getting take-out orders. We raised \$250 from the sale of the desserts you so generously donated. The pies were a big favorite and people were disappointed when we sold out of them.

Your Koinonia Fellowship Ministry team would like to extend a huge thank you to everyone. Whether you purchased and donated canned goods or other supplies or made monetary donations to help defray the cost of these items, created and printed tickets, helped set up tables and chairs, worked during the day and/or evening of the fish fry, donated desserts, sold advance tickets, promoted the event with public service announcements and newspaper articles, updated our web site with info on the fish fry, hung up flyers to advertise the event, put up the fish fry sign, stayed and helped clean up the kitchen, put away the tables/chairs, vacuumed, hauled away the trash, prayed for the success of the event, or etc. etc. etc. **we thank you so very much.**

The value of the canned goods, paper products, etc. you donated was over \$600 dollars so your generous contributions greatly increased the profit to the church from this important annual fundraiser.

The fish fry couldn't happen every year without the combined efforts of all the generous people here at Central.

We are blessed to have a congregation that always pitches in and helps. Even though it's a busy evening, it is fun to work side by side with each other and to see so many faces from our community come to our event. We received numerous comments from people that evening on how much they enjoy coming to our fish fry and that it's the best one in this area.

Discover—or rediscover—the majestic architecture of Saint Mary-of-the-Woods. In celebration of the Indiana Bicentennial, Saint Mary-of-the-Woods College and the Sisters of Providence invite the community to an Historic Architecture Open House on October 8, 2016, from 1 p.m. – 4 p.m. Saint Mary-of-the-Woods chronicles nearly two centuries of Indiana's religious and educational history. Designated as an Indiana Bicentennial Legacy Project, the open house is in partnership with Indiana Humanities, Indiana Landmarks and Terre Haute Landmarks, Inc.

Guides in each building will provide information about the aesthetic, cultural and educational contributions of this community, as told through the magnificent architecture. Visitors may tour the main floors of several buildings of the Sisters of Providence including: Blessed Sacrament Chapel (1924), Church of the Immaculate Conception (1886-1907) and Providence Hall (1890). Saint Mary-of-the-Woods College buildings include Conservatory of Music (1913), Guerin Hall (1913), Le Fer Residence Hall (1923) and Rooney Library (1964). Landscapes and buildings represent the neoclassical, renaissance revival, and other popular architectural styles of the era, including the City Beautiful Movement and Mid-Century styles.

The open house highlights a collection of buildings designed by four generations of the family of Diederich Bohlen, who established one of Indiana's foremost architectural firms. The Bohlen firm also designed Crown Hill Cemetery Chapel, Indianapolis' City Market and the Morris Butler House. The firm completed over 60 works at Saint Mary-of-the-Woods. Spanning nearly a century, the buildings illuminate stylistic features across a body of work and how they continue to be relevant to recent construction.
